- 5. Jess was wise beyond her years. She just "got it." She recognized what was important and wasn't bothered by what was truly frivolous. [Sometimes if Hannah didn't know exactly how to the help the girls with their homework, Jess would say, "I'll help them, Ms. Hannah. Just go ahead and fix their to them lunches. Then she'd smile."]
- 6. She had a kind heart.
 - a. Blythe always has the hardest time buckling herself into the car, but Jess was always there to help buckle her seatbelt for her.
 - b. When Jess and the girls played board games at our house, she'd always make sure that Blythe or Libby Grace would win.

- c. When Hannah picked up Jess after Christmas break, she told her it was so good to hear her voice...that she had missed hearing her voice over the holidays.
- 7. Jess had such a generous spirit she was always thinking of others. [She never went to the zoo or the aquarium with us that she didn't bring back a special gift for Jack.]
- 8. Jess was comfortable being Jess. She was ok with who she was and was not. Books and nature yay! Soccer and horses nay! And that was a-ok.

Hannah said that she politely admitted she had no idea -- and then immediately returned to coloring her princess picture.]
- 12.Jess saw the good in everyone and everything. This is oh-so rare in a child of her age. [One day she found a disgusting little doll in the park. It was all covered in dirt who knew how long it had been there?! Hannah told her to please leave it, but instead Jess brought her the doll the next day all cleaned up and "prettified."]
- 13. Jess' glass was always ½ full.
- 14.Jess was a vegetarian, but she could eat anyone under-the-table when it came to snacks. Hannah said that she could eat an entire pantry, but a couple of months ago, Jess decided it was time to limit herself to just three snacks a day. But sweet Hannah would always pack "extra snacks" in Reese's lunchbox for her to share with Jess at lunch.;)
- 15.Jess had a wicked sense of humor. [One day Blythe had given Hannah a special rock to hold onto. It was literally the size of a grain of salt...teenietiny. Hannah accidentally dropped it in the car (and of course it was gone forever). She asked Jess not to say anything to Blythe in hopes that she'd forget she'd given it to her. As Ashley put it, "This world needs more people like Jess, and I am blessed to have encountered her."

And I agree. Our world needs more people Jess.
